Lendl advances

Top seed Ivan Lendl, looking to become the fifth man to win all four Grand Slam titles, survived a surprisingly stiff challenge by unseeded Brad Pearce and advanced Wednesday to Wimbledon's semifinals with a rain-delayed 6-4, 6-4, 5-7, 6-4 victory.

On Friday, Lendl will face his first seeded opponent of the tournament, No. 3 Stefan Edberg. Defending champion Boris Becker also advanced to the semifinals and will meet unseeded Goran Ivanisevic, the 18-year-old who beat him in the first round of the French Open.

In a pairing Wednesday of hard-serving unseeded players, Ivanisevic reached his first Grand Slam semifinal with a 4-6, 6-4, 6-4, 6-7 (8-10), 6-3 victory over 1985 finalist Kevin Curren.

One more time

Four years later, it's West Germany and Argentina all over again. West Germany became the first country to qualify for three straight World Cup finals Wednesday night, defeating England and goalkeeping great Peter Shilton 4-3 in a penalty-kick

The West Germans, who played England to a 1-1 draw after 120 minutes of regulation and overtime, now meet defending champion Argentina in Rome Sunday in a rematch of the 1986 World Cup final. England will play Italy for third place in Bari Saturday.

In another World Cup note, one person was killed and 16 were injured during a violent celebration of Argentina's semifinal victory Tuesday night over Italy.

Jeff Cannada ran a hot race on a hot day.

Cannada, 24, an Arizona native who trains in Ann Arbor, won the seventh annual Clawson Firecracker Mile in muggy 78-degree heat Wednesday morning in a record 4:02.9, shattering the old mark of 4:06.4 set in 1987 by Tim Simpson.

The winner led from start to finish, pulling away from a front-running four-man pack in the final quarter-mile. Cannada's splits were 59 seconds, 2:02 and 3:05.

Simpson, 26, of East Lansing finished third Wednesday in 4:08.4. Metamora resident Dennis Topolinski, 22, was second in 4:07.3 and Mike Fredrick, 24, of Ann Arbor was fourth in 4:08.7. The best local finisher was Guy Murray, 23, of Ferndale, who was fifth in 4:11.1.

Mary Peruski, 23, of Dearborn was the women's winner. She was timed in 4:49.2, well off the record of 4:38.4 set by Lisa Weidenbach of Battle Creek in 1987. Ella Willis, 32, of Detroit, the defending women's champion, was second behind Peruski in 5:03.6.

Peruski, who graduated from Central Michigan in May, finished second in the 1500 meter run and third in the 5000 in the Mid-American Conference track meet last spring.

A record field of more than 200 runners competed Wednesday on a certified course which takes participants east on 14 Mile from Crooks to Main. Both Cannada and Peruski won \$300 for their efforts.

Berkley sets off a few baseball firecrackers

The Berkley 18th District American Legion baseball team developed a new way to beat Wednesday's stifling heat — play a nine-inning game instead of the usual seven.

"It was an endurance test," said Berkley manager Bob Sanderson after his team beat Brighton Legion 10-9 in the Firecracker Invitational tournament's scheduled nine-inning championship game at Auburn Hills Avondale. "Some of the kids had spots in front of their eyes. The (more

than 90 degree) heat must have been getting to them."

Berkley, however, needed those two extra innings to dispose of Brighton, which took a 9-3 lead after a seven-run fifth.

Six runs in the fifth and sixth innings combined drew Berkley even. In the bottom of the eighth, Mike Cavanaugh stroked a leadoff single, advanced on Jim Rowan's sacrifice and scored on a Matt Gumbel single to give Berkley a 10-9 lead.

Mike Nylund, who took the mound with

one out in the top of the eighth, held Brighton off the board in the ninth to earn the victory in relief of Tom Cavanaugh.

Berkley's Dave Wood (3-for-3) finished the game with five RBI thanks to a three-run homer and a two-run double. Mike Cavanaugh went 3-for-4.

Berkley advanced to the tourney championship game after a five-inning 9-1 decision earlier Wednesday over Dearborn Heights Legion. Berkley took a 7-0 lead in the first on just one hit.

Nylund earned the win with a three-hit pitching performance. Scott Collins, Glen Scheerer, Jim Ellis and Darin Idyle each tallied a hit for Berkley.

These players achieved their goals

As the people of the world peer into Italy and observe the quadrennial soccer chase — also known as the World Cup — what better time is there to focus our eyes a little closer to home?

It was an exciting close last month when Livonia Stevenson edged Rochester Adams 2-1 to snare the Class A title and Madison Heights Bishop Foley knocked off Plainwell 3-2 to win its second Class B-C-D crown in three years.

Hats off to the champs and the other teams representing *The Daily Tribune* area. Five *Tribune* squads won district championships before exiting the state tournament.

Besides state champion Bishop Foley and state runnerup Adams, Detroit Country Day reached the Class B-C-D semifinals; Birmingham Marian lost its only match in a Class A quarterfinal shootout and defending Class A state champion Troy Athens lost 1-0 in overtime to Marian in regional action.

In an effort to recognize the outstanding presents its All-Area Girls Prep Soccer Team.

Deviating from the spirit of the World Cup, where one and two goals is norm for most matches, we'd like to feature a potent offense with four forwards, three midfielders and three defenders to spice up the attack.

With senior Stephanie Kane of Adams, the *Tribune* Player of the Year, senior Nicole Keisoglou of Royal Oak Kimball and sophomores Lisa Grace of Athens and Natalie Neaton of Country Day, the *Tribune*'s All-Area Team had little trouble filling the net from the forward position.

Kane (20 goals-19 assists) scored her team's only goal in the Class A final on a penalty kick as the two-year captain led an inspired band of Highlanders to the

championship match.

Her knack of distributing the ball to her teammates prohibited the opposition from keying on one or two players and led Adams to a 4-6 goals per game average.

Keisoglou's (19-17) ability to put the ball in the net sparked Kimball to a fine 10-4-3 record in the playoffs and a charge at the Southeastern Michigan Association title, but it wasn't the marksmanship that excited her coach.

"Nicole scored more goals last year (23) but had only two assists," said Coach Clint Clark. "Last year, if you marked her we didn't score. This year she got more people involved in the offense and we had more success as a team."

The two-time captain took the Kimball career scoring record (70 goals in four years) with her when she graduated.

The amazing Grace (24-11) topped her 23-goal performance as a freshman and if she hadn't suffered a knee injury in the district game against Troy, the Red Hawks may have duplicated the Pistons' two-time championship feat in 1990.

Grace earned 85 points this year and moved into fifth place on the all-time scoring list at Athens.

Neaton would qualify as soccer's equivalent of Michael Jordan. Her 48 goals this year against a tougher schedule than a year ago fell just shy of her freshman 55-goal total.

Quick for a big girl, Neaton shook off defenders like flies, managed to produce key goals and led the Yellowjackets to their second trip to the state semifinals.

With the fearsome foursome up front, the aggressive trio of senior Kathy Monroe of Bishop Foley, sophomore Molly Ferguson of Marian and junior Pam Stoffel of Troy would have a field day hounding an opponent or creating plays in the midfield.

Numbers alone didn't tell the story for Monroe (5-7), who helped drive Bishop Foley

to its second Class B-C-D state championship in three years. Her assist against Plainwell made her the only Venture to earn a point in all three state final appearances.

Like her stats, Monroe took a beating by playing as much in the defensive third of the field as in the offensive third while the Ventures struggled through 13 matches against Class A schools.

"Kathy had a great season," said Coach Franco Perot. "She was everywhere, especially during the state tournament."

Ferguson's (21-11) offensive talent allowed her to outscore most forwards in the state while leading the Mustangs to a 12-1-3 record. Marian's only setback was a 1-0 shootout loss to Farmington Hills Mercy in the state quarterfinals.

Stoffel (10-11) caught more than the eye of opponents with her rugged style of play. Her ability to jump into an offensive mode helped the Colts reach the district final.

Sophomore goalkeeper Kristi McGough of Athens probably would see very little action on this honor team, but her skills would definitely thwart most attempts should a striker slip through the defense.

McGough backstopped the Red Hawks to another Metro Suburban Association championship and posted 11 clean sheets in 164 games while yielding seven goals for a 0.43 goals against average.

Pity the fool who trespasses against *The Tribune*'s version of the Bermuda Triangle — senior Maria Neubauer of Adams, junior Teri Corcoran of Troy and junior Jennifer Riker of Marian.

Many players ventured near this outstanding defensive trio during the season, but not many were rewarded with success when the game was on the line.

Neubauer (4-2), a 5-foot-10 team co-captain, led a stingy veteran Adams backline that was responsible for the Highlanders posting 11 shutouts and an 0.79 goals

against average through 19 games.

Corcoran (7-9), a mobile Rock of Gibraltar, was a key factor in the Colts' claiming another Southeastern Michigan Association title. She was recently honored as the second best player in the state as a member of the All-State squad selected by the Michigan High School Soccer Coaches Association.

"Teri comes through offensively and defensively and she's so dangerous coming out of the back," said Troy coach Kevin Kelly. "She's a top defender. She's a leader and she's strong and very aggressive. It doesn't matter who's coming at her."

Riker (1-21), a card carrying member of the Mustangs' "Iron Curtain," had her incredible foot in 22 of the 48 goals scored by the Catholic League champions.

"Jenny took all the corner kicks, throw-ins and all of our set pieces," said Coach Morris Lupenec, whose squad was eliminated in the state quarterfinals for the second straight season.

The *Tribune* Second Team features the same 4-3-3 alignment and the class rank fell into the same format with four seniors, three juniors, two sophomores and the team's only freshman comprising the squad.

Patrolling the defense, senior Beth Hück (10-16) of Athens, sophomore Kathy Offer (23 goals) of Royal Oak Shrine and frosh Kara Nance (12-20) of Adams could clog the seams or initiate the attack with the turn of a toe.

Anchoring the defense, senior Mary Beth Sands of Bishop Foley, junior Kim Chenet of Marian and sophomore Kristen Westveer of Country Day added another wall of support in front of second team senior keeper Susan Stag of Bishop Foley.

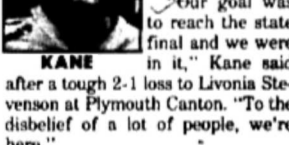

State Bill vetoed

The line item vetoes came on a supplemental budget bill approved by the Legislature last week. The proposal reduces spending in some areas and increases it in others for a net increase of \$11.6 million in spending.

The rain-threatened ceremony, attended by Mayor Jacques Chirac and U.S. Ambassador Walter Curley, marked the official start of construction on the \$26.7 million center, which will be the largest such American facility in Europe when completed in 1992.

Christian Scientists guilty of manslaughter

Each parent faces 20-year sentence in son's death

BOSTON — A Christian Scientist couple was convicted of involuntary manslaughter Wednesday for relying on prayer and foregoing conventional medical treatment for an illness that killed their young son.

A jury of eight women and four men determined David and Ginger Twitchell committed wanton neglect in allowing their 2 1/2-year-old son Robyn to die of a bowel obstruction after a five-day illness in April 1986.

The verdict in the case, which pitted religious freedom against the state's right to protect children from abuse, was handed down in Suffolk County Superior Court at

about 5 p.m. after slightly more than two days of deliberation.

The Twitchells, who each face a maximum of 20 years in prison, showed no emotion as the verdict was read. Defense attorney Rikki Klieman asked Hamlin to poll the jurors to make sure they were certain of their verdict, but the judge refused. Several jurors wept as they left the courtroom.

Klieman, who said she would appeal, denounced the verdict as a "mockery" of the Christian Science faith which relies on spiritual healing rather than modern medicine to fight illness and injury.

The conviction was the fifth of

Christian Science practitioners in the United States and all remain on appeal. Sentencing has not yet been set in the Twitchells' case.

The jury had asked Hamlin late in the day for a clarification in the definition of manslaughter — the third time it had sought instructions in the course of its deliberations. After a short conference, they returned to announce the verdict.

"Christian Science was on trial from beginning to end. A mockery was made of the faith in that courtroom. This type of conduct should not be condoned in the criminal justice system," an angry Klieman said outside the courtroom.

Massachusetts law recognizes spiritual healing a viable form of medicine, but Hamlin told the jury the statute requires that parents seek professional care for children with life-threatening diseases or injuries.

"Christian Science has an extraordinary record of healing, but they're saying that it has to be a perfect record," said church spokesman Nathan Talbot. "It's very different standard from that held up for medical practice."

"But that's all right, we can't complain about that. We'll have to do better with our spiritual healing."

— Black nationalist leader Nelson Mandela headed home Wednesday after agreeing to disagree with Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher about the wisdom of keeping economic sanctions against South Africa's white-minority government until it eradicates apartheid.

Mandela gave an upbeat assessment of his three-hour meeting with Thatcher, who has refused to join other Western leaders in advocating continuation of the use of sanctions. He said he and Thatcher respected each other's position on tactics to end apartheid, South Africa's system of racial segregation.

"I accept that she is an enemy of apartheid and racism," the

deputy president of the African National Congress said during a news conference. "We have started a process of consultation, and that is important."
