Coaches thrilled by decision

Area soccer conches were excited Monday
to hear that the Unites States had been
named the host of the 1994 World Cup

"I'm elated," said Al Sherrington, president of the Royal Oak Youth Soccer Associa-tion and coach of the Michigan boys un-der-161/2 Olympic Development Team. "It's

the best thing that could have happened to soccer in the United States."
Hosting the World Cup can't hurt the youth programs in the United States. But the area most affected by the announcement could be American soccer at the interna-

"Hopefully, this will help the U.S. Socoer Federation get some corporate backing, said Royal Oak Shrine boys coach Ed Lubanski. That could make it worthwhile for players to put in the years of hard work it takes to make a World Cup team.

"Until then, it's not worth it for a college player to continue. As it is now, they have to play just because of their love of soccer. Hopefully, someone will step in and sponsor

the national team. This could do it. Troy Athens boys and girls coach Tim Storch had similar feelings.

"It can only have a positive effect," Storch said. "Our numbers at the youth level are the highest of any participatory sport, but where we fall behind is after college. This could have an impact that will change things in the long run. It won't happen overnight."

The coaches weren't surprised that the
United States was chosen to host the Cup.
"Eight years ago, we wanted to host it, but
it went to Mexico," Sherrington said. "The
people involved at that time didn't know how
to go about getting it. But, in eight years,
we've learned a lot and I thought we would
get it."

"I think it was a good decision," Storch
added, "It was based on the fact that the

U.S. can offer a lot of media exposure.

"Another factor was at the L.A. Olympics, soccer was the most widely viewed of all the events. The international (soccer) body saw that 1.4 million people viewed soccer at the Olympics and it was impressed by that. It certainly wasn't impressed by our international soccer tradition, because we don't have any."
The United States position in world soccer

could change in a few years, however, when the children now involved in youth programs

"Soccer is the fastest growing sport in the United States," said Sherrington, who re-cently was appointed coach at U-D Jesuit High School. "I'm convinced that before too long, soccer will have overtaken sports like baseball and football at the high school level, at least in terms of participation.

United States will host World Cup

By The Associated Press ZURICH, Switzerland — The United States was chosen Monday to host the 1994 World Cup finals, marking a historic break in the soccer championship's halfntury history. The U.S. bid to stage the world's biggest

sports event, held every four years, got 10 votes from international soccer's chiefs. Morocco received seven and Brazil two.

Two Brazilians on the 21-member Executive Committee abstained on the vote, including FIFA President Joao Havelange.

The four-week, 52-match tournament certainly will be the biggest undertaking ever for American soccer As host, the United States auto-

matically will qualify for the 1994 World Cup. A U.S. team has made the field for

this year's Olympic soccer tournament. In checking the other bidders, FIFA inspectors found Brazilian stadiums needed major overhauls, casting doubt on the economically troubled country's hosting ability. A three-time world champion. Brazil staged the 1950 World Cup.

Morocco, host of this year's African Nations' Cup, would have had to build nine new stadiums to fulfill FIFA's minimum requirement.

Monday's decision, which was widely expected, awarded the World Cup finals for the first time to a country without a mass soccer following. It also broke the exclusive hold by Latin America and Western Europe on venues since the championship's debut in 1930.
