Weidenbach, 25, of Battle Creek, who broke her old Firecracker record of 4:40.5 set last year, started out quickly and coasted

"I kind of tubed it at the end," said Weidenbach. "I thought I had the race won at about the halfway point."

The 23-year-old Simpson came to Clawson with outstanding credentials ... he has won the Golden Mile at the Cherry Festival in Traverse City for the past two years.
