

Lemon law enacted; Seattle up on blocks

SEATTLE — The Tigers won the final three games of a four-game series with Seattle with the kind of baseball that saw a different player come through each game.

Chet Lemon was the hero Sunday, sparking a five-run rally in the second inning which sent the Tigers on their way to a 7-5 victory over the Mariners.

"Anyone can have a good game on this team," Lemon said. "Today it was my turn."

The Tigers scored five runs off Seattle starter Mark Langston, 10-7, in the second inning when he walked two, hit Bill Madlock with a pitch and gave up five hits, including a two-run single by Lemon.

Lemon added a solo home run in the fifth, his 10th.

Dan Petry, 6-4, posted his fourth straight win, going seven innings. The Tigers' starter

gave up seven hits while striking out three and walking three.

Reliever Mike Henneman earned his second save, striking out two in the final two innings.

"Even though I gave up five runs, this is the best I've pitched in the games I've won," Petry said.

Seattle rallied for two runs in the second on Dave Valle's eighth homer of the year and three in the fifth with the help of consecutive RBI doubles by Rey Quinones and Harold Reynolds.

Detroit scored its final run in the sixth on Jim Walewander's RBI single.

"We battled back, but didn't get the key hits," said Seattle manager Dick Williams.

Langston failed to reach the sixth inning for the first time in 18 appearances this year, but he retained his major league strikeout lead, fanning five. Langston has 142 strikeouts, one more than Houston's Mike Scott.

When gun sounded, they ran away from Crooks

CLAWSON — One question was on the minds of many of the 4,000 to 5,000 spectators who were on hand for the fourth annual Firecracker Mile in Clawson Saturday.

"Will the four-minute barrier be broken?" It wasn't, but both the men's and women's records were shattered on the sunny morning.

East Lansing's Tim Simpson was the first of over 200 runners to cross the finish line in the race on Fourteen-Mile from Crooks to Main, hitting the tape in 4:06.4, nearly two seconds ahead of his closest pursuers.

The old record of 4:06.8 was set last year by Dave Meyer of Ann Arbor, who didn't return to defend his title.

Defending Firecracker women's champion and 1985 Boston Marathon women's winner Lisa Weidenbach won again, blowing past the field to triumph in 4:38.4. Runnerup Ella

Willis, 29, of Detroit, still hampered by an ankle she injured in a race two months ago, was timed in 5:13.3.

Weidenbach, 25, of Battle Creek, who broke her old Firecracker record of 4:40.5 set last year, started out quickly and coasted into the finish.

"I kind of tubed it at the end," said Weidenbach. "I thought I had the race won at about the halfway point."

The 23-year-old Simpson came to Clawson with outstanding credentials ... he has won the Golden Mile at the Cherry Festival in Traverse City for the past two years.

"I figured I had it won throughout the whole race," said Simpson, a former Michigan State track and cross country star, after winning the Firecracker.

Simpson ran a 3:41 for 1500 meters this past spring for MSU. This time, which converts to a sub-four minute mile, placed him 11th in the NCAA outdoor track championships.

He also ran a 14:08 in the 5,000 and finished fourth in the Big Ten outdoor championships.

Former Hillsdale College track and cross country standout Paul Aufdenberg, 22, of Detroit took second behind Simpson in 4:08.2 and Cliff Dwelle, 18, of Lake Orion was third in 4:08.6.

The next four finishers came in under 4:14. Mike Kavulich, 22, of Berkley, who ran with Simpson at Michigan State, was seventh in 4:13.4. Kavulich had the best finish of any local male entrant.

Cathy Paklaian, 35, of Troy was the top local finisher among the women. She was third in her division in 5:33.5.

Both Simpson and Weidenbach won \$300 each for being the champions. Aufdenberg and Willis both took home \$100 for their second-place performances.

Sorry Ivan, but he was Aussie-some!

WIMBLEDON, England — Pat Cash, his devastating serve working to perfection, crushed Ivan Lendl on Sunday to become the first Australian since 1971 to capture the Wimbledon men's singles and again deny the world's top-ranked player the title he covets most.

Ranked 413th in the world following an injury-plagued 1986 and the 11th seed entering the tournament, Cash showed Lendl how to play on grass, the one surface the world's top-ranked player and

No. 2 seed here has been unable to conquer.

The scores were 7-6, 6-3, 7-5 as Cash won 20 consecutive points on his serve in the second set. He followed his victory by climbing through the stands to embrace his family and friends.

The 22-year-old Cash joined Rod Laver and John Newcombe as the only Australians to win the world's most prestigious grass-court tournament since the open era began in 1968. The Australians dominated throughout the 1960s and '70s. Newcombe was the last Aussie to

win — 16 years ago.

It was the second consecutive trip to the Wimbledon final for Lendl, who had said beforehand he would give up some of his biggest victories to win tennis' most coveted prize. Instead, he left with another defeat.

There was nothing that Lendl, the reigning U.S. Open and French Open champion, could do on the hot, sunny day to cool down the charging Cash.

"I thought I played very good, tight tennis for a set and a half," Lendl said. "He just played great."

Jim Evans From Hagler to haggler

For so many years, it seemed the man was sculpted from stone.

Brought forth from a union between man and woman? No way. Nothing so ordinary. Maybe the result of a collision between mountains. Possibly the outcome of a meteor that crashed into the earth from the planet Krypton or something.

A little bit of chiseling and there was Marvin Hagler.

A couple of raps with the sledge and there was the famous boxer.

Glistening muscles and rippling stomach. An etched scowl and a demeanor carved with menace.

A head of glistening slate and fists blasted from some quarry. Hagler always seemed so impenetrable. He always appeared to be so invincible.

And then he lost to Sugar Ray Leonard.

"I can remember when Marvin first came into the gym," recalled Pat Petronelli, one of Hagler's trainers. "He walked through the door and we really didn't think he was anything special. He didn't look any different than a lot of the other kids we had."

He was 16 then. His physique was mere speculation. His boxing skills were nothing but gut reactions. Wild rights and lefts thrown from rage.

"He'd lose to a lot of the guys in the gym back then," continued Pat. "But he'd always want to climb back into the ring and go at the guy again. And you know what? He'd always win the next time, too."

And then there was Sugar Ray Leonard.

Hagler has never bothered acclimating himself to losing.

When he'd lose back in Brockton, the other boxers didn't have the luxury of saying no. It wasn't a question of whether the two would meet again in the ring, it was a matter of when. Okay Marvin, we'll get it on tomorrow. Or the next day. Or maybe the week after next. Hagler would wait. The wakeup call would inevitably come.

Then Marvin would climb back into the ring and extract his pound of flesh. He'd rear back and snarl and exercise all of the demons that had plagued him with doubts and anxieties ever since he got whipped.

Then Pat or Goody, his brother, would ring the bell. It would be over and Marvin would climb back through the rope happy. He'd reclaimed his identity. He'd been reborn, but hardly in a religious sense.

It had always been that way. Back when he was an amateur, when everyone was paid with items like room and board and maybe a couple of movies on the weekends.

Even in the pros, too. Willie "The Worm" Monroe knocked Hagler around pretty good right after he began fighting for more than pot roast and pats on the back. That was in the Forum in Philadelphia. Okay, Mr. Monroe, said Hagler afterwards. You won. Then Marvin whipped The Worm good in a rematch.

Give and take. Black eye for an eye. Missing tooth for a tooth. Eventually, Hagler began to be the one doing all of the giving.

And then there was Sugar Ray Leonard.

It was a couple of months ago when Hagler and Leonard stepped into the ring together. It was under the glittering sheen of Las Vegas where Sugar Ray put on a dazzling show worthy of a headliner

at Caesars.

Mugging for the cameras. Dancing for the fans. Lightning quick combinations that looked good from the audience, but hardly caused any damage on the stage. Pretty stuff that plays well on the marquee and MTV.

All the superficial pyrotechnics made Hagler blink and look awkward. The same man who had look so invincible for so long looked like a teen with pockmarks in his armor. The champion resembled that 16-year-old kid who walked into the Petronelli gym in Brockton so long ago.

There will be no rematch because Leonard isn't stupid. Sugar Ray has looked at Hagler's background and checked the medical histories of all those who were foolish enough to allow Marvin that luxury.

Quite honestly, Hagler isn't handling the rejection very well. He's not used to having the door slammed in his face. He's not used to be left twisting with his anxieties and self-doubt. Losses, as infrequent as they were, had to be excoriated. Tomorrow. The day after tomorrow or next week.

Hagler has always been a gut fighter. He's always relied on his instincts and urges. Get hit and strike back. Get whipped and lash back.

But Leonard isn't around for the repercussions. So Marvin's wife says he's lashing back at her. She went to court last week and filed for divorce. Keep him away from me, she said.

He needs help. Beulah Hagler claimed. She said he's doing cocaine and drinking too much. Hagler denies beating his wife. He also denies using any drugs but alcohol. Maybe I have been drinking too much, admitted Marvin.

Booze is no way to exorcise demons. Marvin. Beulah isn't Sugar Ray.

Jane Geddes wins in 'holey Toledo'

TOLEDO, Ohio — Jane Geddes, who started the day in sixth place, shot a final-round 5-under-par 67 Sunday for a two-stroke victory over rookies Nancy Taylor and Jill Briles in the \$225,000 Jamie Farr Toledo Classic.

Geddes, who is second on the LPGA Tour in earnings this year, finished the four rounds over the 6,202-yard, par-72 Glenarroy Country Club course at 280.

The reigning LPGA Championship and

U.S. Women's Open winner, Geddes registered her sixth birdie of the round when she rolled in a putt on the 15th hole to move to nine under and into a brief tie with Taylor.

Seconds later, Taylor double-bogeyed the 365-yard, par-4 13th hole and Geddes had the lead.

Taylor, who earned her tour card last October, had never led an LPGA event but she led after each of the first three rounds and until the 13th hole of the final round.

Briles moved into second with a birdie at 13 to go to eight under. She then grabbed a share of the lead when Geddes bogeyed 17.

But Briles bogeyed the 15th hole to fall out of the tie and Briles and Taylor, playing in the same group, bogeyed the 17th hole to give Geddes the two-stroke lead.

The leaders played the final holes in a steady downpour.

AL roundup Chicago wins 17-0 ... White Sox, not Bears

Scott Nielsen pitched a six-hitter and Ken Williams and Harold Baines each drove in four runs as the visiting Chicago White Sox had 21 hits to route to blasting the reeling Cleveland Indians 17-0 Sunday. It was the sixth victory in the last seven games for Chicago. Cleveland, meanwhile, has been outscored 117-42 while losing 12 of its last 14 games. The Indians are last in the American League in runs scored and earned run average and have the worst record in baseball. Ozzie Guillen and Greg Walker each drove in three runs and Carlton Fisk, Steve Lyons and Williams each scored three. Guillen, Baines and Fisk each had three hits and all 10 Chicago batters had at least one. Phil Niekro, 6-8, was the loser, allowing eight runs on seven hits in three innings. In other American League action Sunday: ATHLETICS 6, RED SOX 3: Mark McGwire became the first rookie to hit 30 homers before the All-Star break and Jose Canseco honored two, leading host Oakland. McGwire, batting behind Canseco, was hit by a pitch by Dennis "Oil Can" Boyd in the sixth after Canseco homered. McGwire again was hit by a pitch in the eighth, a beanball by Wes Gardner that caromed off McGwire's helmet to the back screen and brought the Athletics charging out of the dugout. Manager Tony LaRussa led the charge but was restrained by the umpires from going after Gardner and no punches were thrown. RANGERS 10, YANKEES 4: Larry Parrish and Mike Stanley hit two-run homers in a six-run fourth inning that carried visiting Texas past New York. The Rangers are 5-3 against the Yankees this season and can win an overall series from New York for the first time in their 16-year history by splitting a four-game set in Texas July 16-19. ROYALS 4, BLUE JAYS 3: George Brett's single into centerfield scored Willie Wilson from second base in the 10th inning as Kansas City handed visiting Toronto its eighth straight loss. TWINS 4, ORIOLES 3: Kent Hrbek led off the ninth inning with his 22nd homer, giving host Minnesota a three-game sweep of Baltimore, which has lost seven straight and 90 of 95 games. Hrbek hit a 1-1 pitch off losing pitcher Tom Niedenfur, 1-2, over the rightfield wall.
